Veterans benefits are beginning to evolve and burial and funeral costs are at the forefront of those changes. The expanded benefits include reimbursements for transporting remains to state and tribal veterans cemeteries, in addition to previously eligible national cemeteries; allowances for VA plots or interments for tribal organizations; and higher payments for non-service-connected burial benefits, according to a news release Friday.

"Last fiscal year, VA delivered more than 84,000 burial benefits to families of veterans," Joshua Jacobs, the VA's under secretary for benefits, said in the news release. "Expanding burial benefits means we are able to ensure veterans are honored in their final resting place, and assist their family, caregivers, and survivors during the difficult time of their loved one's passing."

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Gov. Reynolds Announces Iowa Budget Surplus of \$1.83B

On September 27, 2023, Gov. Kim Reynolds announced the State of lowa will end Fiscal Year 2023 with a balance of \$1.83 billion in the General Fund, \$902 million in reserve funds and \$2.74 billion in the Taxpayer Relief Fund. IFDA Lobbyist Mike Triplett shares "It is possible that Governor Reynolds will look to accelerate the income tax changes made over the past few years, either by moving up the four-year phase-in or reducing the final rate in TY 2026 from 3.9 percent to something smaller."

"Some see a surplus as government not spending enough, but I view it as an over collection from the hard-working men and women of lowa," said Gov. Kim Reynolds. "We've seen what the powerful combination of growth-oriented policies and fiscal restraint can create, and now it's time for lowans to directly receive the benefits. I look forward to cutting taxes again next legislative session and returning this surplus back to where it belongs – the people of lowa."



"As a result of the Governor's great budget management, we are in an extremely strong financial position, making it possible to meet the needs of lowans while leaving more money in the pockets of lowa taxpayers," said Kraig Paulsen, Director of the Department of Management. Last week, Gov. Reynolds announced that lowa's corporate tax rate will drop to 7.1 percent from 8.4 percent for Tax Year 2024 due to corporate tax receipts exceeding \$700 million.
